In January, we hosted our first VSA Barn Raising event in Delta where we outlined the current direction and needs of the VSA and asked for ideas, volunteerism, and support from the community at large. We spent much of our time during the first half of the season on board recruitment and training; with our new board members in place, we are turning our attention toward the rest of our organizational structure to ensure we have the best people in the right places to propel us to even greater success.

We are also in the bittersweet process of bidding farewell to long-term VSA Board Members Hartland H. Clubb, Jr., and Priscilla Fry, who will retire from the VSA Board in May after about 15 years of board service each—and even more as VSA musician members (since the '80s for Hartland and the '90s for Priscilla).

As we try to capture the depth of their knowledge and experience on all things VSA, we thank them profusely for the time and energy they have dedicated to shepherding the VSA into becoming the successful, growing nonprofit it is today.

As we begin to look towards Season 53, we're getting excited about our conductors' lively, creative ideas for the upcoming year, including new collaborations between chorus and orchestra, music from your favorite cartoons, masterworks of epic proportions, and music that celebrates the natural beauty all around us. We are also excited to announce a new format for our Pops concerts that will see the orchestra return to Cedaredge and the chorus extending to Ridgway for the first time. 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
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#### WELCOME OUR NEW BOARD MEMBER Catherine Buckley Hoffman Member-At-Large

# TROY RAPER

**Orchestra Conductor & Music Director** Musician, educator, and Colorado native Troy Raper began his teaching career in 1988 and retired from Mesa County Valley School District #51 in 2022 after 31 years in education. He holds a bachelor's degree in music education from the University of Northern Colorado, where he graduated with honors, and a master's degree in education from Lesley University with an emphasis in educational technology.

During his long career, Raper's school orchestras were consistently awarded superior ratings at music festivals from Palisade to Disneyland. Many former students are now accomplished professional teachers and performers around the country.

As an active advocate in Colorado for teaching, Raper spent 10 years as chair/board member for the Colorado All State Orchestra Governing Board, helping to create a new charter and direction for the organization. He has also served as a board member of the Colorado Chapter of the American String Teachers Association, and as a member of the Colorado Music Educators Association State Board. He currently serves as production manager and librarian to the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra (GJSO).

Raper is an accomplished musician with broad performing experience. He has played with the Greeley, Ft. Collins, Cheyenne, Durango, and Crested Butte festival orchestras and sits as principal bassist for the GJSO. He performs regularly in various jazz bands, recording studios, and as a concert soloist.

His hobbies and personal interests include spending time with his family. His wife, Lori, is an accomplished professional artist and teacher, and their adult daughters, Mandolyn and Melody, both work in careers in music and teaching. He enjoys arranging music for strings, computer games, mountain biking, riding his motorcycle, and remodeling projects in his new home.

### KATY KRISTOFFERSEN Chorus Conductor

Katy Kristoffersen's 20 years of experience in coaching, accompanying, conducting, and teaching are backed by undergraduate degrees in music and psychology (Miami University, OH) and a master's in music education (College of Mount St. Joseph).

Enamored of music from the start, at 2 she was reaching for the piano to emulate her talented older siblings. She started composing piano pieces at 4 and accompanying church choirs by 12.

As an undergrad, Katy had the great privilege of studying with Dr. Ethan Sperry, a world-renowned name in the choral and world-music spheres. He helped to draw out her confidence as an arranger and composer. Katy dated Mike Kristoffersen (bass) throughout college, which led to her accompanying every single string bass player in the university. She also caught the eye of bass professor, Dr. Steve Ullery, who requested that she accompany his recital as well as the great Edgar Meyer when he visited to teach a master class.

"Accompanist" is a good metaphor for Katy's skillset, although "joyful forklift" is apt, too. Katy thrives when in service of elevating people around her. This energy has drawn her to stretch her skills outward in several directions: through the lens of music (choral director, music director, private teacher, music educator, accompanist), and through the lens of mindfulness (teaching her original curriculum to corporate and government agencies, private coaching, and starting her own mindfulness course with Mike).

When not hopping from one responsibility to the next, you might find Katy and Mike trail running near their Ridgway home, hiking with their kids, or just sitting outside in the awe and beauty that drew them here in the first place.

## SANDRA SUNDSTROM Concertmaster

Sandy grew up in Colorado Springs, CO, in a family of musicians. She was involved in orchestras, choirs, and bands throughout her youth, and earned her bachelor of music in education with an instrumental major and choral minor from Arizona State University. Sandy has taught band, choir, and orchestra in all levels of education, elementary through college.


In 2010, she and her family moved to Grand Junction. Sandy is a violinist with the Grand Junction Symphony

Orchestra (GJSO), High Desert Opera, and Rockestra, and has an active private studio teaching violin, viola, and cello. Her quartet performs in churches and for area events, and she plays in regional gigs, performs regularly in Aspen for summer weddings, and is a recurring violin coach for Camp Con Brio. Sandy adjudicates for the District 51 Solo/Ensemble, local auditions, and judged the Colorado West Invitational Music Festival in 2013. She was an active member of the GJSO Board for many years and served on their music director search committee.

In 2013, she started as a paraprofessional in Mesa County School District. Sandy assists orchestras at several middle schools, and in 2014, she was a long-term sub for choirs at a local high school.

Sandy and her husband have two daughters, a son, and three grandchildren. They absolutely love living in Grand Junction: the people, surrounding views, and connections they've made.

What is a concertmaster? The concertmaster is the principal or "first chair" violinist who leads the orchestra in its tuning prior to the concert and customarily plays all violin solos within pieces. As the leader of the entire string section, the concertmaster also marks the orchestra's scores with the appropriate bowings to ensure all the strings are moving and playing in unison, and translates instructions from the conductor into specific technical language for strings.

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## FEATURED MUSICIAN Julie Appelhanz - Viola

Julie has played the violin for 39 years and the viola for 33 years. She started lessons with Sharon Gillespie, a Suzuki teacher in Boulder, CO. She joined her middle school orchestra and transitioned from violin to viola in the space of a single school year. She went from trying to convince her parents to let her quit playing the violin to wanting to pursue a career as a symphonic violist. She credits her orchestra director, Brett Wallace, with this about-face and for his inspiration. "I connected with the viola in a way I hadn't with violin, but now I love both instruments."

She went on to earn a bachelor's degree in music performance at Concordia College in Moorhead, MN, and a master's degree in music performance at University of Denver. She has played as a violist with the San Juan (Durango), Grand Junction, Cheyenne, Fort Collins, Greeley, Boulder, Colorado Springs, and Colorado Symphonies. She is a private instructor of violin and viola, both classical and folk styles, at Precedence Music Academy in Montrose where she very much appreciates the community of teachers. In addition, she also assists with sectionals and mentoring for the Valley Youth Orchestra. Julie also plays the Norwegian Hardanger Fiddle and spent a year in Norway studying folk music and culture.

Born in Boulder, CO, she moved to Montrose in August 2009. Shortly thereafter, "I married a widower with four kids and was busy getting the hang of that situation." In her spare time, she enjoys knitting, sewing, camping, hiking, and ATVing.

She joined the VSA around 2012. "The VSA is a very important part of our community! Coming together to master a piece of orchestral music and share it with the larger community is an amazing thing. I believe that humans need to make music together and share it with audiences, regardless of professional or amateur level, and it is something I encourage all students to try out."

#### From the Music Director

I love movies! But more importantly, I love the music that makes the movies. When working with movie music you must understand the emotional and narrative power of music, as well as the importance of collaboration in the creative process. Movie composers use the imagery and the story to build art that is truly "new" in the world of music. While most composers "borrow" themes—or straight out steal material—from previous composers, they creatively negotiate the twists and turns of the story and interweave sound and story into what we hear. This concert takes you on a journey of images through sound.



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# A Night at the Movies CONCERT NOTES

John Williams' contribution to film music is monumental, marked by his ability to create scores that deeply resonate with the narrative and emotional landscape of the movies he works on. His approach to composing is often likened to sculpting, where he meticulously shapes and arranges a few notes to uncover the musical piece within, akin to a sculptor revealing a statue from a block of stone.

**Howard Shore** is a renowned Canadian composer known for his extensive film scoring work. Born on October 18, 1946, in Toronto, Ontario, Shore has created soundtracks for many prominent films, including *The Lord of the Rings* trilogy, for which he won three Academy Awards. He has collaborated with notable directors such as David Cronenberg and Martin Scorsese, showcasing his versatility across various film genres. Shore's contributions to music extend beyond film, including operas and concert works, cementing his status as a versatile and influential figure in contemporary music.

James Horner was an acclaimed American composer and conductor, born on August 14, 1953, in Los Angeles, CA. He was renowned for his film scores that often blended classical and contemporary elements. Horner's most celebrated works include the scores for *Titanic*, for which he won two Academy Awards, and *Avatar*, both directed by James Cameron. He also composed music for *Braveheart*, *A Beautiful Mind*, and *Apollo 13*, among others. Horner's unique style and emotional depth in his compositions made him one of the most sought-after composers in Hollywood. Tragically, he passed away on June 22, 2015, leaving behind a legacy of memorable and influential film music.


**Richard Strauss** was a prominent German composer and conductor, born on June 11, 1864, in Munich. He is renowned for his significant contributions to late Romantic and early modern music. Strauss's compositions include operas, such as *Der Rosenkavalier* and *Salome*, and tone poems like *Also Sprach Zarathustra* and *Don Juan*. His music is characterized by its expressive intensity and orchestral innovation. Strauss served as a leading conductor, directing orchestras in Berlin and Vienna. His career spanned the tumultuous shifts of the early 20th century, reflected in his evolving musical style.

**Johann Strauss II**, often called the "Waltz King," was a prolific Austrian composer born on October 25, 1825, in Vienna. He revolutionized the waltz genre, making it popular across Europe. Strauss II composed over 500 waltzes, polkas, quadrilles, and other types of dance music, as well as several operettas and a ballet. His most famous works include *Tales from the Vienna Woods*, *Die Fledermaus*, and *The Blue Danube*, which was prominently used in Stanley Kubrick's 1968 film 2001: A Space Odyssey. His music epitomized the light, entertaining style of the Viennese waltz, and his influence extended well beyond his lifetime.

**Richard Markowitz** was an American film and television composer born on September 3, 1926, in Santa Monica, CA. He began his career in music leading a big band in high school and later served in World War II. Post-war, he studied music in Paris under notable composers like Arthur Honegger and Arnold Schoenberg. Markowitz made his mark in film composing with the 1958 film *Stakeout on Dope Street*. He is well-known for his television work, including composing the theme song for *The Rebel* and scoring for *The Wild, Wild West*. His versatility in composing for a variety of TV series and films highlighted his skill.

#### From the Conductor

The creative and beautiful theme of this concert, Heaven and Bluegrass, was originally conceived by Allyson Cotham (formerly Allyson Connelly), conductor of the VSA Chorus from 2017-2019, and I am so grateful to have inherited it. While our selections differ from the original program—cut tragically due to Covid—today's vision honors and celebrates the original intention. That this concert takes place on Easter weekend feels exactly right, considering the nature of the music: we offer settings of deeply spiritual texts that explore human suffering, mortality, joy, devotion, reverence, and the human desire for meaning.

We are so proud to feature the music of local Montrose bluegrass band, The Black Canyon Boys! Partnering with local musicians is of great importance to our community, and it is extra special today, as it truly embodies the inherently collaborative nature of bluegrass.

You're seeing the musical fruits of our country's ancestral roots, as professionals and amateurs stand side-by-side on stage. This is a live, modern example of how the best music education works: by playing side-by-side with experts and teachers. It's a living metaphor of the core value of the VSA: there is a place for everyone in the arts.

Experience the heart of this music, as we look with eyes heavenbound.

Today's guest artist, **The Black Canyon Boys** are the bluegrass brainchild of Anthony Mainiero, David Lutz, and Karl Topper. Founded right here in Montrose, CO, this mountaingrass band brings joy, energy, and an incredible presence to the stage. With expressive and unique takes on traditional bluegrass, modern jam grass, and anything in between, these guys know their way around the musical landscape to help your feet get stomping and start romping for a good time.

*Wayfarin' Stranger* is an American classic, and many genres claim it as their own, including folk, gospel, and bluegrass music. This particular setting is beloved by many and written for the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and Orchestra by **Mack Wilberg**.

*I Am a Man of Constant Sorrow* is a traditional American folk song, initially titled *Farewell Song*. Its origin is officially unknown, like so many folk and bluegrass songs, but affiliated with its 1913 publisher R. D. Burnett, known as "The Blind Man." The piece you hear today includes biblical references to blindness and the "man of sorrows" from Isaiah: 53:3. It has been sung by the Stanley Brothers, Bob Dylan, Joan Baez, and of course, the Soggy Bottom Boys, featured in the film *O Brother, Where Art Thou*?

John Tavener, British composer, set William Blake's famous poem "The Lamb" to music in 15 minutes. Apparently he heard the whole of this piece in the car and wrote it almost instantly, saying, "I read the words, and immediately I heard the notes." In essence, Blake's poem is about the duality of Jesus and God as two different but related entities. Blake also contrasts youth and old age. Listen for Tavener's clever use of mirroring a melody to create an unsettling chromatic harmony, as he expresses musical duality, dissonance, and contrast in his interpretation of the text.

Didn't Leave Nobody But the Baby and I'll Fly Away are favorite selections from the fabulous O Brother, Where Art Thou? bluegrass/country/folk soundtrack. Didn't Leave Nobody But the Baby is a reverie about vulnerability, abandonment, and solitude, and the universal search for connection. **Albert Brumley** apparently wrote I'll Fly Away while picking cotton on his father's farm in Oklahoma. Brumley used the idea of a "prison" as a metaphor for life on earth, especially the life of a slave or sharecropper, in Brumley's case.

And Am I Born to Die? **Charles Wesley's** 1763 hymn has been reimagined by the great Doc Watson into a bluegrass/folk classic. The themes within the original hymn–mortality, purpose, existential questions–are themes found far and wide in bluegrass music. This particular arrangement is based on the Béla Fleck/Abigail Washburn cover of this haunting tune.

**Palestrina's "Sanctus"** from *Missa Aeterna Christi Munera* has been described as "...art at its simplest and finest," by score editor Henry Washington. The mass, in its entirety, is revered by great composers from Bach to Debussy. This short section is a treat on the ears. It explores a small musical idea in motet form, so you will hear all four sections playing with the same motif throughout the piece at different times. It is a truly beautiful addition to the "Heaven" portion of today's program, as the text aligns with our Easter weekend performance: "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest."

Hark, I Hear the Harps Eternal is my favorite arrangement of another song found in The Southern Harmony and Musical Companion compilation, published by William Walker in 1834. Alice Parker just shines here. Listen for the joy that she evokes with the rhythmic "Alleluia" section. Wondrous Love, another lovely setting by **Alice Parker and Robert Shaw**, is truly reverent in its treatment of the famous American hymn tune. This is another example of a piece that is rooted in many traditions of American music, including folk and bluegrass.

The Emperor Waltz (Kaiser-Walzer) is a famous waltz by **Johann Strauss II**, composed in 1889. This piece, originally titled *Hand in Hand*, was intended as a tribute to the friendship between Austria and Germany, represented by Emperor Franz Joseph I of Austria and Kaiser Wilhelm II of Germany. The waltz is characterized by its majestic introduction, leading into a series of melodic and graceful waltz themes. It's known for its rich orchestration and distinctive Viennese style, reflecting Strauss's mastery in waltz composition. The piece has become a staple in classical music repertoire, often performed at concerts and ballroom events, epitomizing the elegance and charm of the late 19th-century Viennese culture.

Three Cuban Dances is a set of piano pieces composed by **Ignacio Cervantes**, a Cuban pianist and composer. Cervantes, known for blending European classical music with Afro-Cuban rhythms, created these dances as part of his contribution to the late 19th-century salon music tradition. These pieces are characterized by their lively, rhythmic qualities that reflect the fusion of cultural influences in Cuba. They are celebrated for capturing the essence of Cuban musical styles, combining elegance with vibrant, danceable rhythms, making them popular among both classical musicians and enthusiasts of Cuban music.

*Blue Tango* is an instrumental composition by **Leroy Anderson**, written in 1951. This piece became one of Anderson's first major successes and a popular light music classic. It is known for blending the traditional rhythmic structure of the tango with a distinctive, dreamy melodic line, giving it a unique and memorable character. The use of pizzicato strings and lush orchestration adds to its charm, making it a favorite in both concert performances and recordings. *Blue Tango* exemplifies Anderson's talent for creating music that is both accessible and artistically rich, bridging the gap between classical and popular music genres.

**Antonín Dvořák** was a renowned Czech composer of the late 19th century, born on September 8, 1841, in Nelahozeves, Bohemia (now Czech Republic). He is widely recognized for his contribution to classical music, especially for his symphonies, chamber music, operas, and concerti. His most famous work is the *Symphony No. 9*, "From the New World," which reflects both his European roots and his fascination with American folk music. Dvořák's compositions are celebrated for melodic inventiveness, rich orchestrations, and incorporation of elements from Czech folk music, contributing significantly to the nationalist music movement. He also served as the director of the National Conservatory of Music in New York City for a time.

An American in Paris Suite is an extended symphonic composition by **George Gershwin**, composed in 1928. Inspired by Gershwin's time in Paris, it evokes the sights and energy of the French capital in the 1920s. The piece is known for its innovative use of jazz and classical elements, and it famously incorporates the sound of Parisian taxi horns. It's a vibrant, rhythmic work that blends various musical styles, reflecting Gershwin's unique ability to bridge the gap between classical and popular music.

Purchasing a single piece of music can run upwards of \$500—or up to \$3000 if it must be rented. All music must be either purchased or rented for every concert unless it's available in our own music library, which has been amassed over the last 52+ years. To help offset the costs of music purchases for a single concert, this season, we added a "concert repertoire underwriter" option at \$1000 per concert to the ways anyone can help make the music possible for the VSA.

We're ecstatic to report that VSA Orchestra bassist Richard Hansen and his wife, Cindy, have stepped up as our first concert repertoire underwriters for the April orchestra concert!

In addition, the Hansens also purchased carts for our newly procured posture chairs, along with underwriting Richard's bass section mate, Mike Kristoffersen!

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### **DISCOVERING OUR ROOTS**

Volunteer orchestral and choral groups like the VSA are an outcropping from the concept of the American community band, which predates the Civil War. Immigrants brought the band tradition with them to the US, where thousands of ordinary citizens participated in these ensembles.

After the Civil War, census figures indicated that, across the country, there were about 10,000 community bands. Town bands were admired and provided townspeople with popular, light entertainment for concerts. While the quality of performance varied, the enjoyment and value to each town's social and cultural climate is undeniable.

Community bands experienced a great dying out after World War I, victims of a cultural shift to mass media, radio, and more, all which led to a rise in school music programs. The increased number of musicians who learned an instrument and played in high school and college bands but did not pursue music as a career also provided a rich pool of amateur talent seeking an outlet for their musical abilities. As a result—and ironically—there was once again a rise in participation in community bands.

While there will always be music teachers and professional musicians participating in volunteer music performance groups like the VSA, the majority of members come from professions that are not related to music. Most are amateurs who enjoyed playing in school and missed the camaraderie and music-making. Others are students looking to gain more rehearsal time and learn from more experienced musicians.

These ensembles give *everyone*, regardless of their age or chosen career path, a place to play their instrument, contribute to their community, and most especially, to enjoy themselves while making music.



#### SALUTE TO OUR ROOTS Founders Ted and Tricia Dickenson

Ted was a young intern at Vancouver General Hospital in Vancouver, BC, Canada, where he met Tricia, a nursing student. They married in 1958.

What followed is an amazing story of commitment to family and community. Tricia, the youngest and only daughter of four children, was born and raised in a small town on Vancouver Island where her father was the superintendent of the local lumber mill. Ted came from Champaign, IL, where his father was a professor of economics at the University of Illinois. The importance of community was foundational to their upbringing.

Shortly after marrying, Ted and Tricia moved to Georgia, where Ted served as a flight surgeon in the United States Air Force. Next, they were off to Denver, where Ted completed his surgical residency and established his own practice in general surgery. Tricia worked as a surgical nurse at National Jewish Hospital and volunteered at the Molly Brown House Museum.

Then the unexpected happened. Jim Austin (Mont-

rose city manager), Steve Scott (Montrose Memorial Hospital administrator), and Robert Schmidt (Montrose school superintendent) showed up to recruit Ted to join the hospital staff in Montrose. In the spirit of enthusiasm, openness to change, and with a natural leaning toward curiosity and courage for adventure, they packed up and moved--five days later! The young family, which now included three daughters, Heather, Jennie and Karen, quickly settled into their new life in Montrose.

A significant piece of the recruitment was the expectation that Ted become an integral part of the community to help Montrose continue to grow as a thriving community. And so, it began.

Ted's community resume is impressive. It included the Rotary Club, Montrose Community Foundation, founder of the Montrose Academic Booster Club, Montrose Woodworkers Guild, numerous Montrose Memorial Hospital committees, and Daily Press medical columnist, to name a few. He founded the Montrose Academic Booster Club and co-founded the Montrose Forum. He lived commitment to community service by example, continually encouraging others to embrace that same commitment.

Tricia's resume is equally impressive. She filled in as a surgical nurse at the hospital, was a county health nurse and a cofounder of the first home health

business in Montrose and was a consultant and instructor to providers and counselors with Community Options.

But it didn't stop there for Tricia. Her community involvement also included starting the Montrose Arts Council, appointment to the first city planning commission, election to the city council in 1988, and serving as Montrose mayor for three terms. In 2018 she received a life achievement award as a Montrose "Woman of Distinction." She also cut the ribbon for the opening of the Montrose Pavilion and was a member of the Valley Symphony Women's Auxiliary.

And one other combined and notable resume item: Ted and Tricia became part of the elite group of Valley Symphony Association (VSA) founders in the late 1970s. Ted's love of classical music nurtured Tricia's, and it resulted in their decades-long commitment to supporting the VSA, She quite proudly describes the VSA as belonging to the regional community. "It's ours—and it's damn good!"

With vivaciousness and life-loving spirit, Ted and Tricia lived their community commitment to the fullest. Ted passed unexpectedly in 2012; Tricia continues to enjoy attending concerts. The VSA is grateful for their role as founders.

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## OUR HISTORY: BRINGING CLASSICAL MUSIC TO LIFE!

In 1970 a small group of classical musicians met in the parlor of Wilma and Charles Lowell's Eckert home. By October, 1971, the Delta County Community Orchestra was under the baton of Walter Birkedahl of Mesa State College and first performed on March 2, 1972, at Cedaredge Hunsicker Elementary School. On March 16, 1978, the nonprofit known as the Valley Symphony Association was formed to sponsor the orchestra. At that



time, nearly 50 musicians from Montrose, Delta, Grand Junction, Ouray, Gunnison, Paonia, Hotchkiss, Cedaredge, and Eckert practiced once a week in Delta and performed four annual concerts.

In the late 1990s and early 2000s, numerous choirs, like the Grand Mesa Singers and the Christmas in the Valley chorus, were seasonal contributors to the orchestra, mainly at Christmas concerts. In 2002, these choral groups combined and came under the VSA umbrella to create the VSA Chorus.

The VSA continues to grow in membership, musical ability, audience size, and program variety, and is thought to be the only orchestra in Colorado that is not based in a college community. Today, the VSA's 100+ regional volunteer musicians come together from throughout the Uncompahgre, Grand, and North Fork Valleys to bring their skill, passion, and talent to the stage.

The VSA believes in the transformative power of music to inspire and entertain. Our diverse regional volunteer musicians treasure the opportunity to perform live to connect Western Slope audiences of all ages. The VSA's goal and purpose is to ensure that future generations will enjoy the legacy of live orchestral and choral music that so magnificently celebrates the human spirit.

As a regional, all-volunteer performing arts organization, the VSA takes pride in their long history of keeping classical music vital, building future audiences, and bringing classical music to life on the Western Slope.





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#### FEATURED MUSICIAN Sheri Williams - Horn

Sheri has been playing horn since she started in 5th grade in Colorado Springs. She chose it because it was her favorite brother's instrument. Her love of music started much earlier than that, though, with piano lessons and singing as a young child—but don't ask her to do either now! She ended up loving the sound of the horn and was glad that she chose it as the best instrument for her.

Sheri had a music studio and gave music lessons periodically during the years of having a young family and through several moves away from Colorado and around the Midwest. Unfortunately, she didn't have much of a chance to play horn during that time. She started again while living in a small Wisconsin town, outside the Twin Cities area, around 2012. It was a joy to be back playing in an orchestra.

Married to Dave for nearly 28 years now, they moved to Cedaredge seven years ago for him to pastor New Hope Church. They are thankful to be near the mountains again and love to hike, kayak, and camp when they are able. They are brand-new empty nesters after sending their youngest off to college in August and are hoping to use the extra time to have more adventures in our beautiful area.


