

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
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SALUTE TO OUR ROOTS: Dedication



For all they've done for the VSA, we dedicate our Season 52 fall performances to the Neills, for their early influence on the VSA Chorus, and for Wendy as our lonatime webmaster.

Kelly grew up in Paonia and learned to love music as a student of Jan Tuin, Vivian Cheney, and Karl Hunerwadel. After earning three college music degrees and marrying Wendy, Kelly moved back to the Western Slope as the band director at Delta High School and Middle School. No community choir Kelly and Wendy Neill existed at the time, so the couple started the Grand Mesa Singers in 1998, with Kelly as the music director

and Wendy as the administrator. They started with just 13 singers at Delta's First Baptist on April 4, 1998. Word spread, and the next year the group expanded to 44 singers from all over the Uncompange, North Fork, and Grand Valleys. By 2002, they had a group of 70. That year, they combined with other vocal groups to become the VSA Chorus.

Christmas 2001 is one of Wendy's fondest memories. It was just three months after the 9/11 attacks, and she and Kelly sang the duet "The Prayer" with 100 chorus members and a small group of VSA musicians. It was a magical evening of musical supplication to God for peace. The lyrics carried extra meaning that Christmas: "Lead us to a place, guide us with your grace to a place where we'll be safe."

In 2004, they moved to Arkansas when Kelly was hired by Harding University to teach vocal and choral music. From 2007-2009, Harding gave him leave to get his doctorate in voice performance from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory. He returned to teach at Harding for another 13 vears, conducting the concert choir and the chamber singers, and teaching various music classes. Wendy began Perfect Fit Web Design in 2004 and has been the VSA's webmaster since 2006. She builds and maintains websites for about 70 churches, non-profits, and businesses.

In 2022, Kelly finished a master's degree in counseling and went into full-time ministry. He is now the lead minister at the Bentonville Church of Christ in Arkansas and recently opened Wilderness Counseling, LLC.

Wendy is about to release a six-week Bible study entitled "Looking Forward to Heaven." She is a speaker at women's retreats, works part-time for Iron Rose Sister Ministries, and sings in the Symphony of Northwest Arkansas's SONA Singers.

The couple have three grown daughters (two who were born during their time on the Western Slope), two sons-in-law, and a precious two-year-old granddaughter.

SALUTE TO OUR ROOTS: Founder

Wilma (Kendrick) Lowell had a passion for music that took flight when she left Eckert, CO, in 1941 to attend the University of Denver on a music scholarship. Within the span of a year, her life path changed dramatically with the onset of WW II. She traded learning music theory and practicing, for weather forecasting and decoding as a Navy Wave. While in the Navy, she married an Army Air Force officer from Cedaredge, Charles (Chuck) Lowell.

After the war, Wilma settled into life as a military wife and mother of daughters, Terry and D.Jo. In the mid 1950s, her love of music emerged from the shadows

and again became a priority. Wilma returned to college and completed her music degree. She taught piano from then until her death at the age of 88. Throughout Chuck's career in the Air Force, Wilma honed her skills for organization and developing programs to meet community needs: a 24/7 military base day care center, Turkish/American liaison for language and music, Girl Scouts, and a hobby store in Delta, to name a few.

Retirement saw the Lowell's return to Eckert with their young son, David. It wasn't long before their grown daughters and families also moved to Eckert. Music was a family staple in the Lowell home. Terry and D.Jo started piano and violin at an early age and continued their musical training in college. Years later, young David started learning several instruments. Wilma recognized that little opportunity existed in the area for playing classical music, and she didn't like instruments gathering dust. Subsequently, she began hosting weekly music nights as a way for her family and friends to keep their instruments well dusted!

Eventually, one of those music nights led to a conversation about the lack of a public venue for more classical musicians to play on a regular basis. The question of starting a local orchestra was raised. Wilma needed no additional encouragement, and with the help of a few others—now known along with Wilma as "VSA Founders"—musical magic quickly happened.

The newly organized Valley Symphony had its first concert in Cedaredge in 1971. Fifty-three years later, the Valley Symphony Association continues to thrive.

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Troy Raper

TROY RAPER Orchestra Conductor & Music Director

Musician, educator, and Colorado native Troy Raper began his teaching career in 1988 and retired from District #51 in 2022 after 31 years in education. He holds a bachelor's degree in music education from the University of Northern Colorado, where he graduated with honors, and a master's degree in education from Lesley University with an emphasis in educational technology.

During his long career, Raper's school orchestras were consistently awarded superior ratings at music festivals from Palisade to Disneyland. Many former students are now accomplished professional teachers and performers around the country.

As an active advocate in Colorado for teaching, Raper spent 10 years as chair/board member for the Colorado All State Orchestra Governing Board, helping to create a new charter and direction for the organization. He has also served as a board member of the Colorado Chapter of the American String Teachers Association, and as a member of the Colorado Music Educators Association State Board. He currently serves as production manager and librarian to the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra (GJSO).

Raper is an accomplished musician with broad performing experience. He has played with the Greeley, Ft. Collins, Cheyenne, Durango, and Crested Butte festival orchestras and sits as principal bassist for the GJSO. He performs regularly in various jazz bands, recording studios, and as a concert soloist.

His hobbies and personal interests include spending time with his family. His wife, Lori, is an accomplished professional artist and teacher, and their adult daughters, Mandolyn and Melody, both work in careers in music and teaching. He enjoys arranging music for strings, computer games, mountain biking, riding his motorcycle, and remodeling projects in his new home.

KATY KRISTOFFERSEN Chorus Conductor

Katy Kristoffersen's 20 years of experience in coaching, accompanying, conducting, and teaching are backed by undergraduate degrees in music and psychology (Miami University, OH) and a master's in music education (College of Mount St. Joseph).

Enamored by music from the start, at 2 she was reaching for the piano to emulate her talented older siblings. She started composing piano pieces at 4 and accompanying church choirs by 12.

As an undergrad, Katy had the great privilege of studying with Dr. Ethan Sperry, a world-renowned name in the choral and world-music spheres. He helped to draw out her confidence as an arranger and composer. Katy dated Mike Kristoffersen (contrabass) throughout college, which led to her accompanying every single string bass player in the university. She also caught the eye of bass professor, Dr. Steve Ullery, who requested that she accompany his recital as well as the great Edgar Meyer when he visited to teach a master class.

"Accompanist" is a good metaphor for Katy's skillset, although "joyful forklift" is apt, too. Katy thrives when in service of elevating people around her. This energy has drawn her to stretch her skills outward in several directions: through the lens of music (choral direction, music director, private teacher, music educator, accompanist), and through the lens of mindfulness (teaching her original curriculum to corporate and government agencies, private coaching, and starting her own mindfulness course with Mike).

When not hopping from one responsibility to the next, you might find Katy and Mike trail running near their Ridgway home, hiking with their kids, or just sitting outside in the awe and beauty that drew them here in the first place.

Sandy grew up in Colorado Springs, CO, in a family of musicians. She was involved in orchestras, choirs, and bands throughout her youth, and earned her bachelor of music in education with an instrumental major and choral minor from Arizona State University. Sandy has taught band, choir, and orchestra in all levels of education, elementary through college.


In 2010, she and her family moved to Grand Junction. Sandy is a violinist with the Grand Junction Symphony

Orchestra (GJSO), High Desert Opera, and Rockestra, and has an active private studio teaching violin, viola, and cello. Her quartet performs in churches and for area events, and she plays in regional gigs, performs regularly in Aspen for summer weddings, and is a recurring violin coach for Camp Con Brio. Sandy adjudicates for the District 51 Solo/Ensemble, local auditions, and judged the Colorado West Invitational Music Festival in 2013. She was an active member of the GJSO Board for many years and served on their music director search committee.

In 2013, she started as a paraprofessional in Mesa County School District. Sandy assists orchestras at several middle schools, and in 2014, she was a long-term sub for choirs at a local high school.

Sandy and her husband have two daughters, a son, and three grandchildren. They absolutely love living in Grand Junction: the people, surrounding views, and connections they've made.

What is a concertmaster? The concertmaster is the principal or "first chair" violinist who leads the orchestra in its tuning prior to the concert and customarily plays all violin solos within pieces. As the leader of the entire string section, the concertmaster also marks the orchestra's scores with the appropriate bowings to ensure all the strings are moving and playing in unison, and translates instructions from the conductor into specific technical language for strings.

FEATURED MUSICIAN D.Jo Lowell - Violin I

D.Jo studied piano and violin from an early age, having inherited her love of classical music from her mother, Wilma, who taught piano lessons for decades. As a young mother living in Eckert, D.Jo was an original member of the newly-organized Valley Symphony in Delta County—founded by Wilma.

Life changes resulted in D.Jo returning to college. While completing her undergraduate and graduate degrees, playing music dropped into the shadows.

Following retirement from her career as a Presbyterian minister and chaplain, she returned to Delta County with her wife, Sue, and was amazed to discover that the VSA was alive and flourishing. Inspired by a VSA concert in 2019, D.Jo ended her 40-plus year hiatus from the violin by starting lessons with former VSA Concertmaster Deb TenNapel. "I got the violin back up but had no muscle memory; I couldn't play it," she said. "I told Deb that my goal was to return to the symphony and be in the first violin section." D.Jo rejoined the VSA for the 50th season in 2021 at the *Christmas by Candlelight* concerts.

"I absolutely love playing in the symphony again and feel my musical life has come full circle."

She lives in Grand Junction where she continues violin lessons and spends time practicing, fishing, reading, and enjoying life with her children, grandchildren, and Sue.

"My mother always thought it was unfortunate that there was nowhere for people to play their instruments. This was her dream. She would be grinning ear-to-ear with satisfaction at what the VSA has become."

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Classic Drama: Feel the Music

CONCERT NOTES

Franz Joseph Haydn's *Symphony No. 104*, also known as the "London Symphony," stands as a crowning achievement in the composer's illustrious career and a testament to his enduring influence on classical music. Composed in 1795-1796, it represents the pinnacle of Haydn's symphonic output and encapsulates the spirit of the late 18th-century Viennese symphonic tradition.

One of the *Symphony No. 104's* distinguishing features is its grandeur, which reflects Haydn's awareness of the expanding scale of orchestral performances in his time. This symphony was specifically composed for his two visits to London, and it catered to the taste of the British audience for larger and more majestic symphonies.

Georges Bizet's *L'Arlésienne Suite No. 1* transports audiences to the sun-drenched landscapes and lively villages of Provence, a region celebrated for its rich cultural tapestry. This suite, drawn from Bizet's incidental music for Alphonse Daudet's play *L'Arlésienne*, unfolds like a vivid musical travelogue, revealing the essence of this picturesque corner of southern France.

The suite commences with the "Prelude," a poignant and evocative movement that sets the stage for the dramatic narrative. Here, Bizet's music is a canvas upon which the soul of Provence is painted.

Following the "Prelude," the "Minuet" offers a delightful contrast. This movement is a lively and elegant dance, evoking the heartwarming scenes of a Provençal village square. The music sparkles with vivacity, as strings and woodwinds playfully interact. The "Minuet" captures the spirited, convivial nature of the Provençal people, inviting listeners to partake in their joyful celebrations. It is a testament to Bizet's ability to infuse his compositions with both charm and sophistication.

Johann Sebastian Bach's *Air in D Major*, famously known as the "Air on the G String," is a pinnacle of Baroque elegance. Composed as part of his *Orchestral Suite No. 3 in D major*, *BWV 1068*, it showcases Bach's mastery of melody and harmony. Its serene and timeless beauty is characterized by a flowing, lyrical melody that has the ability to transport listeners to a realm of tranquility and grace. The piece's nickname, "Air on the G String," reflects its popular adaptation for solo violin, emphasizing the simplicity and purity of the main theme. This composition stands as a testament to Bach's enduring influence on classical music.

Franz Joseph Haydn's *Symphony No. 94 in G major*, commonly known as the "Surprise Symphony," is a remarkable composition, celebrated for its engaging and somewhat unexpected second movement. Composed in 1791 during Haydn's time in London, this symphony is a prime example of his wit and creativity.


The second movement of the *Symphony No. 94* is an "Andante" marked by its famous surprise element. Haydn, known for his keen sense of humor, introduces a tranquil and gentle theme, which initially lulls the listener into a state of serenity. However, at a certain point in the movement, there is an abrupt and loud chord, often referred to as the "surprise," that startles the audience. This sudden fortissimo burst serves as a humorous twist within the otherwise peaceful movement, revealing Haydn's penchant for musical humor.

Paul Dukas' The Sorcerer's Apprentice is a captivating symphonic poem composed in 1897. Inspired by Goethe's classic tale, it masterfully narrates the misadventures of a young sorcerer's apprentice who, in a moment of curiosity, invokes a magical spell to animate a broom to perform his chores. Its timeless appeal was further enhanced by its inclusion in Disney's *Fantasia*, ensuring its place as a beloved and enduring piece in the world of classical music.

In the Steppes of Central Asia is a musical masterpiece by Alexander Borodin, a prominent Russian composer. Composed in 1880, it paints a vivid musical picture of the vast Central Asian landscape. Borodin skillfully weaves Russian and Asian themes together, creating a rich tapestry of melodies that evoke a sense of boundless expanse and nomadic life.

Giuseppe Verdi's "Triumphal March" from his opera *Aida* is a stirring and iconic piece of music that stands as a testament to the composer's genius. *Aida* is set in ancient Egypt and tells a tragic love story amidst the backdrop of war and conflict. The "Triumphal March" comes at the end of Act II and is one of the opera's most famous and grandiose moments.

Verdi's mastery in this piece lies not only in its musical brilliance but also in its ability to convey the contrasting emotions of triumph and love. While the march exudes pomp and pageantry, it also underscores the inner turmoil of the characters, particularly the love triangle between Radamès, Aida, and Amneris

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Christmas By Candlelight: 'Twas the Night Before Christmas

CONCERT NOTES

Hark! The Herald Angels Sing is a timeless Christmas carol that has been embraced by countless generations during the festive season. Written in the 18th century by Charles Wesley, the lyrics of this song capture the essence of Christmas: the birth of Jesus Christ, and the profound hope and joy that this event brought to the world. The music, penned by Felix Mendelssohn, beautifully complements the lyrics. Its uplifting melody and harmonious chords evoke feelings of celebration, gratitude, and reverence. Over time, the carol has been adapted and performed in numerous styles and languages, further cementing its universal appeal.

In Sing We Now of Christmas, Fred Prentice teaches a master class on how to build a steady crescendo. Listen for the growing complexity in harmony, rhythm, and volume as the piece progresses to its fabulous finish.

While the origin of *Riu Riu Chiu* is officially unknown, it is often attributed to **Mateo Flecha the Elder**, who lived in the first half of the 16th century. The piece is written in the style of a Spanish villancico, or a common poetic/musical form from the time. Essentially, the gist of the piece is this: "With a cry of *Riu*, *riu*, *chiu*, *the kingfisher*, *God kept the wolf from our Lamb*." The text is a beautifully poetic description of the nativity of Christ and the Immaculate Conception.

Ralph Vaughan Williams, one of the most influential English composers of the 20th century, had an innate ability to evoke the spirit of England's pastoral landscapes and its deep-rooted folk traditions. His works are characterized by their lyrical beauty, and this is especially true for his Christmas music.

Gustav Holst's *Christmas Day* is a choral fantasy on old carols, weaving together a tapestry of melodies that evoke the festive spirit of the Christmas season. Holst, an English composer best known for his orchestral suite *The Planets*, had a deep interest in folk songs and traditional melodies. *Christmas Day* stands as a testament to his ability to blend these age-old tunes into something fresh and evocative. Composed in 1910, *Christmas Day* begins with the familiar and beloved carol "Good Christian Men, Rejoice." As the piece progresses, Holst seamlessly transitions between various carols, including "God Rest You Merry, Gentlemen," "Come, Ye Lofty, Come, Ye Lowly," and "The First Noel." This masterful integration of different melodies gives the piece a sense of journey—from the quiet anticipation of Christmas Eve to the jubilant celebration of Christmas morning.

Published in 1964, Ave Maria made the composer, Franz Biebl, a favorite among choruses around the world. When you listen to the piece, it feels like being hit with waves of gorgeous sound, over and over again. Listen for repeated ascending scales—almost like prayers floating up to heaven. And for the final nine measures, notice the rising "Amen" distributed among all singers—walking up a simple scale to the best finish ever.

Personent Hodie by John Rutter is an absolute blast for singers and audiences alike. It is rhythmic in the most basic way: with repeated half-note pulses on a single syllable that make you want to dance! Robert Cummings, writing in the Allmusic guide, states that the "...melody is glorious and ebullient in its lively, triumphant manner. It largely consists of bright, resolute three-note phrases whose overall structure gradually rises, then descends." The piece tells the story of Jesus' birth with the feeling of bells ringing and angels singing!

Leroy Anderson's *A Christmas Festival* is an iconic medley of beloved Christmas carols, masterfully woven into a symphonic tapestry. Composed in 1950, the piece was originally written for the Boston Pops Orchestra, and under the baton of legendary conductor Arthur Fiedler. Anderson's genius lies in his ability to seamlessly transition between these carols, creating a cohesive narrative that captures the essence of the holiday season.

The "Hallelujah Chorus" stands as one of the most recognized and celebrated pieces in Western choral music. This triumphant chorus is part of **George Frideric Handel's** *Messiah*, an oratorio composed in 1741. Though *Messiah* encompasses the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, it is the "Hallelujah Chorus" that often resonates most deeply with audiences, encapsulating the joy and majesty of the work.





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DISCOVERING OUR ROOTS

Volunteer orchestral and choral groups like the VSA are an outcropping from the concept of the American community band, which predates the Civil War. Immigrants brought the band tradition with them to the US, where thousands of ordinary citizens participated in these ensembles.

After the Civil War, census figures indicated that, across the country, there were about 10,000 community bands. Town bands were admired and provided townspeople with popular, light entertainment for concerts. While the quality of performance varied, the enjoyment and value to each town's social and cultural climate is undeniable.

Community bands experienced a great dying out after World War I, victims of a cultural shift to mass media, radio, and more, all which led to a rise in school music programs. The increased number of musicians who learned an instrument and played in high school and college bands but did not pursue music as a career also provided a rich pool of amateur talent seeking an outlet for their musical abilities. As a result—and ironically—there was once again a rise in participation in community bands.

While there will always be music teachers and professional musicians participating in volunteer music performance groups like the VSA, the majority of members come from professions that are not related to music. Most are amateurs who enjoyed playing in school and missed the camaraderie and music-making. Others are students looking to gain more rehearsal time and learn from more experienced musicians.

These ensembles give *everyone*, regardless of their age or chosen career path, a place to play their instrument, contribute to their community, and most especially, to enjoy themselves while making music.



FEATURED MUSICIAN Barb Krebs - Soprano 2

Barb Krebs is a "charter member" of the VSA Chorus. In 2001 she joined the Grand Mesa Singers, one of various choral groups that were seasonal contributors to the VSA, mainly at Christmas concerts, and in 2002, these choral groups combined and came under the VSA umbrella to create the VSA Chorus.

Although she's had no formal voice training, Barb has been singing with her family at home, on car trips, and at Girl Scout camp. It was, and has always been, one of her favorite activities. At South High School in Denver, she sang with the

acapella concert choir under the direction of Richard Eichenberger. Each year the choir learned one challenging Bach double-choir motet (a piece of sacred choral music) as part of their repertoire. After performing it numerous times, it was recorded at the end of the school year, a process that gave Barb a new outlook on singing. "Having it be quality enough to record elevated its importance to me."

Her husband, Stuart, became a geography professor at Colorado State University in Ft. Collins, which was a logical outgrowth of several years of travel. Among their exploits, he and Barb drove from Europe to Pakistan on a mountaineering expedition to the Hindu Kush mountains. Several years later, as a graduate research assistant in Chile, the couple drove home over the Pan-American Highway (10,000 miles from Santiago, Chile, to Montrose).

While in Ft. Collins, Barb got deeply involved in international folk dancing and joined a performance group. She especially enjoyed Balkan music with its exotic rhythms and music.

In 1983, Barb and her family moved to Montrose, Stuart's home town. Years passed before she joined the Grand Mesa Singers, and she was very glad to be back in a choir.

Barb's sons, Sven (Arizona) and Arn (Rhode Island), sometimes return when the chorus performs. Barb says the boys are good critics and huge fans of the chorus.

"It's a great benefit to my life that I have been able to participate in the VSA with folks who are so dedicated to creating a wonderful musical experience for all. Thanks to everyone—conductors, singers, musicians, and audience."









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OUR HISTORY: BRINGING CLASSICAL MUSIC TO LIFE!

In 1970 a small group of classical musicians met in the parlor of Wilma and Charles Lowell's Eckert home. By October, 1971, the Delta County Community Orchestra was under the baton of Walter Birkedahl of Mesa State College and first performed on March 2, 1972, at Cedaredge Hunsicker Elementary School. On March 16, 1978, the nonprofit known as the Valley Symphony Association was formed to sponsor the orchestra. At that



time, nearly 50 musicians from Montrose, Delta, Grand Junction, Ouray, Gunnison, Paonia, Hotchkiss, Cedaredge, and Eckert practiced once a week in Delta and performed four annual concerts.

In the late 1990s and early 2000s, numerous choirs, like the Grand Mesa Singers and the Christmas in the Valley chorus, were seasonal contributors to the orchestra, mainly at Christmas concerts. In 2002, these choral groups combined and came under the VSA umbrella to create the VSA Chorus.

The VSA continues to grow in membership, musical ability, audience size, and program variety, and is thought to be the only orchestra in Colorado that is not based in a college community. Today, the VSA's 100+ regional volunteer musicians come together from throughout the Uncompandere, Grand, and North Fork Valleys to bring their skill, passion, and talent to the stage.

The VSA believes in the transformative power of music to inspire and entertain. Our diverse regional volunteer musicians treasure the opportunity to perform live to connect Western Slope audiences of all ages. The VSA's goal and purpose is to ensure that future generations will enjoy the legacy of live orchestral and choral music that so magnificently celebrates the human spirit.

As a regional, all-volunteer performing arts organization, the VSA takes pride in their long history of keeping classical music vital, building future audiences, and bringing classical music to life on the Western Slope.





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
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FEATURED MUSICIAN Chase Houck - Violin I


