

- The fast or "Viennese" Waltz was made forever popular by the Strauss family (Johann, along with his sons Johann Strauss II, Eduard Strauss, and Josef Strauss).
- Wiener Blut ('Viennese Blood', 'Vienna Blood' or 'Viennese Spirit') Op. 354 is a waltz by Johann Strauss II first performed by the composer in 1873.





 In popular culture, you'll hear this waltz in movies like Hitchcock's Suspicion (1941), Zombieland (2009), Sherlock Holmes: A Game of Shadows (2011), in the TV miniseries Anne of Green Gables (1985), and in cartoons like the Bugs Bunny short Herr Meets Hare and the Tom and Jerry episode Johann Mouse.





- While the waltz is traditionally a dance in which two individuals move together in closed position (face-to-face) in threequarter time, it has influenced multiple styles of dance, including ballet—and is probably played in just about every ballet class in the world.
- In ballet, the waltz helps dancers learn to control both body and momentum. It develops balance, along with leg and ankle strength, as dancers learn to rise up on toes and lower into the knees as they travel and change direction.



 Given the level of artistry intended for ballroom dances, it is no wonder that choreographers used Viennese waltzes—or increasingly asked their own collaborating musicians to compose new waltzes—for their staged ballets.

Slavonic Dances

- The Slavonic Dances are a series of 16 orchestral pieces composed by Antonín Dvořák in 1878 and 1886.
- Originally written for piano four hands, the Slavonic Dances were inspired by Brahms's Hungarian Dances.
- Whereas Brahms made use of actual Hungarian folk melodies, Dvořák only made use of the characteristic rhythms of Slavic folk music: the melodies are entirely his own.

Blue Tango

- Blue Tango, composed in 1951 by American Composer Leroy Anderson, was his breakout hit.
- Anderson thought that the song's popularity was "completely unbelievable," because the kind of music he wrote was not popular music: it was concert music.
- Anderson when on to compose some of America's most beloved and well-known songs, including Sleigh Ride, often performed at our Christmas by Candlelight concerts.





Blue Tango

- One of the most fascinating of all dances, the tango is a sensual ballroom dance that originated in Buenos Aires, Argentina, in the early twentieth century.
- The tango dance is usually performed by a man and a woman, expressing an element of romance in their synchronized movements.





Lord of the Dance

- Popularized by Michael Flatley, the story follows the character the Lord of the Dance and his fight against the evil dark lord.
- The themes are based on ancient Irish folklore and some biblical references; the title itself, along with the central musical theme, is taken from a contemporary hymn.





Lord of the Dance

 Originally from Ireland, clogging is a type of folk dance practiced in the United States in which the dancer's footwear is used percussively by striking the heel, the toe, or both against a floor or each other to create audible rhythms, usually to the downbeat with the heel keeping the rhythm.

- Our logo was created to strategically identify our organization by name and infuse visual elements that distinguish our purpose, approach, and locale.
- The stylized treble and bass clefs integrated within the initials represent us as a musical organization.
- The five lines of the staff and double bar lines provide additional musical references.
- The staff also alludes to our locale, as the topmost line is a silhouette of the San Juan Mountain range that overlooks the Uncompange, Grand, and North Fork Valleys from which our musicians hail.
- The graceful, yet animated font used in the initials suggests approachable elegance, a visual nod to our main focus on classical music.

A Salute to Big Bands

- Big bands originated during the early 1910s and dominated jazz in the early 1940s when swing was most popular.
- The term "big band" is also used to describe a genre of music, although this was not the only style of music played by big bands, and started as accompaniment for dancing.
- Big Bands led by conductors like Duke Ellington, Glen Miller, Count Basie, and Benny Goodman dominated the music scene for nearly 40 years.

In the Mood

- In the Mood is a popular Big Band jazz standard.
- Composed by saxophonist Joe Garland in 1938, In the Mood was based on an instrumental he wrote with trumpeter Wingy Malone in 1930 called *Tar Paper Stomp*.
- The most popular recording of the song was recorded by American bandleader Glenn Miller.

 In 1983, Glenn Miller's recording of In The Mood was inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame, and in 2004, into the Library of Congress National Recording Registry, which consists of recordings that are "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant."

Larry Sims' influence on the VSA cannot be overstated: he was a musician (principal clarinetist for decades), board member, publicist, ticket vendor; he created programs, sold advertising, recorded concerts and provided CDs to musicians—and he arranged music for orchestra, like today's version of In The Mood. Larry retired to Idaho in 2005, but we continue to reap the rewards of his generous service. He wore just about every hat within the VSA, and our hats are off to him in thanks.

Bohemian Rhapsody

- Written by Freddie Mercury of the legendary rock band Queen, Bohemian Rhapsody broke all the rules of rock and pop.
- The song began life sometime in the late 60s, when
 Freddie was a student at Ealing Art College. It started life as a
 few ideas for a song scribbled on scraps of paper.
- It took rock and pop away from the normal path, as it blends rock and opera and is a totally unique musical work.





Bohemian Rhapsody

- Radio stations were initially reluctant to play the extremely long 5.55 minute song, fearing audiences would react unfavorably. In fact, the song spent 14 weeks at #1 on musical charts in the U.S., as well as around the world.
- Bohemian Rhapsody has sold 2.62 million copies and is the third biggest-selling single of all time.

At Saturday's performance, we warmly welcome and thank Clark Gault, arranger of Queen's Bohemian Rhapsody for orchestra. A native of San Diego, CA, Clark earned a BS in music composition from San Diego State College. He served in the Army as a member of the Norad Band. In the late 70's he wrote music for advertising jingles. Since 2009, he has written and arranged music for the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra and others as well as his own jazz band, the Swing City Express, in which a number of VSA musicians have performed.

- Let's Get Loud is a song recorded by American singer
 Jennifer Lopez, but was originally written by the song's
 co-writer Gloria Estefan for herself.
- She felt the song was too similar to her previous material and passed it onto Lopez. She thought Lopez would have "more fun with it" and would put "a new spin" on it.
- Estefan eventually released her own version of the song in 2011.

Since 1988, Bonnie sang with various choral groups that joined the orchestra in 2002 to become the Valley Symphony Association. "We sang the full Messiah every other year, wore white shirts and dark pants/skirts, and each bought our own copy of the full score."
